### **A Client's Story**

I always thought I had things in place. Then suddenly like dominoes, things

changed overnight. I had been caring for my husband, who had lost both kidneys, and other members of my family. But I hadn't been caring for myself. I got sick because of COPD and a rheumatoid arthritis-like condition and I lost my job in 2012.

I had no source of income at all for a whole year. I was behind in my property taxes and had to file bankruptcy. It was a domino effect. One bad thing after another. I was so distraught, I didn't know which way to turn. I couldn't think.

So I went to The Caring Place not knowing what to expect. People were so nice at The Caring Place. They gave me food and treated me with respect. They did more for me than I ever expected. Besides the food, they helped me pay my utility bills. They helped me get dental assistance. And they helped with my medical bills and enabled me to get medicine for hypertension and cholesterol which I hadn't been taking because I couldn't afford it. They have been a saving grace for me.

When I came to The Caring Place, I had some tall pride swallowing to do. But nobody made me feel less than a person. They are loving about what they do. I like how they meet with you in offices in the back so it's private.

I just didn't know the extent of all

that The Caring Place offered. They didn't send me all over the place looking for services. The Caring Place helped me to get on my feet where I could at least see the light of day. It was by God's grace that I received help from them.

I like to give accolades where they are due and I don't give them easily. What The Caring Place does, matters. In today's economic environment—even though they say that we're in the middle of a recovery—the poor and working class don't necessarily feel it.

I came to The Caring Place for food but they've done so much more. If I could give to The Caring Place, I would give double. They have transformed my life.

Brenda's story is just one of many at The Caring Place, and the demand for basic human needs is growing! In 2014, The Caring Place served over 5,400 individuals. Additionally, of the families we served, 41%, were new clients requesting assistance from The Caring Place. In 2014, compared to the number of families served in 2013, we saw a:

- 60% *increase* in families assisted with clothing and household items
- 52% *increase* in families assisted with utilities to prevent shut-off
- 31% increase in families using our Food Pantry
- 23% increase in families assisted with housing to prevent eviction or foreclosure

# 30 YEARS OF CARING

s The Caring Place celebrates its 30th birthday, it remains true to the mission for which the organization was founded – helping those in crisis with basic human services. We want to recognize and honor the legacy of all the volunteers, Board members and employees who came before us and helped shape The Caring Place into what it is today.

The Caring Place opened on June 8, 1985 with a handful of volunteers, 3 bags of clothes and \$17. Former Georgetown Mayor Carl Doering donated our first building, an old slaughter house on W. 8th Street.

Over the years, The Caring Place has undergone 7 major expansions or relocations to: better serve more client families, improve its ability to accept donated items, and increase sales volume in the thrift store. Today, between its two locations on Railroad Avenue, The Caring Place spans 36,074 square feet, and it takes approximately 100 volunteers and 19 employees to operate the facilities on a daily basis. On average, 119 people come here every day to donate their gently used items for sale in our thrift store.

We know that our future success – helping more families in need – is only possible with the continued support of our community friends and partners. The Caring Place Board of Directors, Advisory Council, volunteers and employees are committed to ensuring that we continue to fullfil our mission to help families in financial crisis. It is because of the continued support from people like you that we are able to honor that commitment. Thank you!



# AMPLIFY AUSTIN: Our Friends Helped Us Beat The Clock!

This year, for the first time, The Caring Place participated in Amplify Austin, a community-wide day of on-line giving. Between March 5th and 6th, 46 individuals donated to our Coats for Kids and Holiday Meal Assistance programs. Donors also made off-line donations to The Caring Place for this event for a grand total of \$4,860. We thank everyone who participated in Amplify Austin. ### AN ALTERNATIVE TO HIGH-INTEREST PAYDAY LOANS



In 2014, First Texas Bank and The Caring Place teamed up to create the exciting new Alternative Loan Program. Designed to assist qualifying clients in paying off a payday loan or title loan with a high interest rate, the ultimate goal of the program is to decrease the use of these loans and help people to rebuild their credit. To date, thirteen individuals or families have participated in the program and one of them has "graduated" by paying back the alternative loan.

#### **GOOD NEIGHBOR FUND**

Did you know that The Caring Place and the City of Georgetown partner to help families in need?

The City of Georgetown sponsors the Good Neighbor Fund, a program that assists people having difficulty paying their utility bill. Voluntary contributions from utility customers fund this program, which is administered by The Caring Place. Every dollar donated helps! ## The Shops at The Caring Place Turning Treasures Into Hope



he Shops at The Caring Place, our thrift store, has grown from a tiny space to approximately 13,000 square feet offering all types of donated items for sale. However, our original mission to serve those in need, has remained the same for the past 30 years. Our clients who qualify for assistance with basic human needs receive a Caring Card which they may use in the store to receive clothing and shoes. Linens, tableware and furniture are also available to them at no cost.

The generosity and support of our community that was so evident when The Caring Place was founded remain unchanged. Because of the population growth in our area and citizens learning about how we help those in need, the volume of quality donations has increased. We strive to be good stewards, turning those items into revenue that supports the entire organization.

In 2014, proceeds from the store accounted for 63% of the organization's entire budget.

The store features all types of mer-

chandise from appliances to zippers, expertly arranged by volunteers and displayed throughout the store. Three specialty shops have been added over the last eight years: The Boutique, featuring designer clothing and accessories; *Outdoors 'n More* for sporting goods and outdoor furniture; and ReFinds, our very own in-house antiques and collectibles venue.

Special events enhance our sales. On the second Thursday of every month, from 12:00 p.m. - 3:30 p.m., our jewelry department organizes a special show and sale displaying costume and fine jewelry. Our grandest special event is Sweets, Treats and Trees, which unveils our Christmas collection. Held two weeks before Thanksgiving, this event attracts more than 600 shoppers, all eager to see the holiday treasures we have carefully sorted and priced throughout the year. We provide homemade refreshments, live music and door prizes designed to give everyone the Christmas spirit.

The story of our thrift store would be incomplete without acknowledging the caring hearts that make every-

thing happen. These hearts belong to our generous, hardworking and committed volunteers. Working with our paid staff members, the volunteers perform all of the tasks necessary to keep the store running smoothly. Our sorters, pricers, cashiers, merchandisers, security and donation workers are all committed to our mission. Without their dedication, the store would not exist. We are always happy to welcome new volunteers; the one thing we can guarantee is that there is always work to be done!

If you participate in our store in any way – as a donor, a shopper or a volunteer - we thank you for your contribution and hope you will continue to visit and support us. All participants are important to our success. Our store hours are 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and until 7:00 p.m. on Thursday. Our drop-off donation area is open 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday. To schedule the pickup of large items, please call 512-943-0711.


